

## Honorary Secretary Report 2016 – Simon Turley

I have now reached the three quarter stage of my four year term of office as ASCN Honorary Secretary.

During the last year I have participated in a wide variety of different events and projects, on behalf of ASCN, utilizing the skills gained in the previous two years on the committee. The year has again been a very busy one, with the demands, experiences and responsibilities of the committee continuing to be many and varied. Along with committee colleagues, I have endeavoured to raise the profile of ASCN UK whenever representing the organization. My role as Honorary Secretary together with the committee work remains interesting, fascinating and exciting, ultimately experiencing and being involved within the uniquely diverse world of stoma care. The year has seen the continued development of the direction of ASCN UK, with a particular focus on education, building on the success of the re-vamped standards, hernia masterclass and development work of the ASCN UK guidelines. The committee have had three face to face meetings as well as regular monthly telephone conference calls in conjunction with our conference organisers, In Conference. Various committee colleagues have also attended the ASCN UK area representative (reps) meetings. The committee has been requested to provide comment and opinions on various documents and protocols. Maddie White and I represented ASCN UK at two meetings with the BHTA, looking at establishing a closer understanding and collaboration between the two organisations. ASCN undertook a mammoth teaching assignment in February, after being invited to provide theory and practical stoma care sessions at The London Nurse show held at Alexandra Palace. Over the two day event, nine one hour sessions were delivered entitled 'Key Principles of Stoma Care', with a collaborative approach undertaken by The Committee and area reps Gill Skipper, Katy Timms, Carolyn Swash, Jo Pragnell, Jo Sica and Michaela Parker. The sessions were well attended and evaluated by delegates.

We have held two very successful ASCN UK area reps meetings in February and July, both in Birmingham, with another meeting planned for November. Each meeting has been well attended, with the area reps enthusiastic and passionate regarding ASCN UK, eager to participate in the continued development of the organization and represent you the members. These meetings have built on the success of the ASCN UK area reps meetings held in 2014 and 2015. The main focus of this year's meetings has been updating their role description, conference and masterclass ideas, views regarding educational direction and the continued development of the ASCN Clinical Guidelines. I hope that you have received a copy of the guidelines for your department. The guidelines cover a range of different topic areas, acting as a clinical resource for all stoma nurses. Wendy Osborne ASCN Educational Officer has led on this project, therefore more information can be obtained within Wendy's report.

The Area representatives and I have continued working on the project updating the ASCN UK stoma nurse membership directory. The project is making good progress and we hope to have the final version finalized soon, which will be available on the ASCN UK website. As part of this work, there have been some changes in a number of the regional areas, partly to enable a more even distribution of the areas and numbers of hospitals contained within, but also due to locality of each of the regional reps. This project has been far from easy, hence the length of time to completion. I would like to take this opportunity to express and extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to the area reps for their hard



work in collecting the information and contributing to this major update. Also to Stacy & Claire at In Conference for their assistance and contribution in finalising details.

Two of the area reps have changed. With Maddie White becoming Shadow Chair, Nicola Payton has taken over as rep for Area 7 West Midlands. Also, Kate Howlett has decided to stand down as joint rep for Area 8 East Midlands due to work commitments, however Michaela Parker will continue as rep. Additionally, as announced at last year's conference, the organization has created the new area of the Republic of Ireland. I am delighted to inform that Mary Quigley and Aine Kennedy have volunteered to represent their Irish colleagues. I would like to take this opportunity to extend a warm welcome to the new reps, and many thanks to Kate for her involvement and contribution. As you will be aware Gilly Tomsett (Vice Chair) and Rebecca Davenport (Treasurer) finish their four year terms at the end of the year. This year ASCN UK was represented by Michaela Parker, East Midland's area rep.
